As we go to press the committee is discussing a new Montage Trophy, at the moment set for 18 January 2022.

Current thinking for the definition of a montage goes like this "A montage comprises individual photographs that relate to each other (theme, story, statement etc.) assembled to create a single image. The montage should be mounted on board (50cm x 40cm portrait or landscape) with as many images as required for the subject matter. The Montage may be created by pasting photographs onto the board or by photo editing software. A member may enter up to two Montages." There will be a further workshop session about montages on 9th November, currently scheduled for the Guide Hut.

EXTERNAL COMPETITIONS

The external competitions season has started and so far we have completed three events.

The Ron Wake Trophy was organised by us in September, and was won by Omer Esit of Watford with his print 'Lonliness'. The print was subsequently used by Watford in the Photographic Alliance Print Championship.

In our first *Rosebowl* round we faced Buckingham, Windsor and Watford. On form Watford should have won and they did. On form we should have been second, but we slipped to third place and receive only two points towards qualification for the final. Our top scorer was 'Worshipper Western Wall Jerusalem' by Alan Colegrave, but we had no stars.

Ten clubs took part in the Park Street Landscapes event. The winner was Harpenden, and we came fifth equal with Watford. Our highest scores were 'Canary Wharf Skyline' by Julia Wainwright and 'Country Fields' by Dave Martin.

By the time of the next Newsletter, we will have completed all three North West Federation matches and be on the way to the second round of the Rosebowl. This year there is no XRR Visions event.

Abstract Street Photography

There are many genres of photography that could be the subject of local club competitions. The niche Flickr pages of "dogs of roofs" is however perhaps a little too specialist, not to say demanding. Where do you get your dog from? From whom do you need permission to put it on a roof? Is there not a danger that a dog might fall and be injured?

But at least one club has contemplated accepting submissions on Intimate Landscapes. This may not be clearly defined, but it's something we might all be able to have a go at in a garden or park. There must be some bit of nature that is especially important to us, or a detail that captures something magical in the natural environment that we would like to photograph.

A genre that may be even more accessible to most of us is Abstract Street
Photography. I think many of us are likely to have a more immediate appreciation of what would and would not count as an example, though there are no doubt also problems of delineation as there are with Intimate Landscapes.

Here is one way at getting at the meaning of abstract street photography. The abstract part implies removing enough of the context of a subject so that what is being seen is not always immediately clear. This would take place in the setting of a street to count as abstract street photography.
