Al and Photography

Mariam gave a fascinating talk about AI in photography at a recent Harrow Camera Club meeting. Avril followed this with consideration of the use and abuse of AI in photography. These prompted the following thoughts

Al talk is all around us now. How does it affect photography?

Much has been made of the image generated by AI that won the Sony Image manipulation. I have nothing against this and think it is an interesting effort. There may have been skill in learning how to master the commands necessary in produce such and image and to have the judgement to choose one over others to show. It is something different to what we do in this club though.

Many programmes (Lightroom, ON 1 Luminar Neo) now use AI in several ways. Most common at the moment is to identify discrete elements within an image in order to mask them for specific treatment. In Luminar Neo for example this can be done for elements such as people, vehicles, sky, water, natural landscape and human landscape. This is useful and timesaving.

More sinister perhaps is the ability in the latest version of Neo to drag in elements from other images on the internet. This strikes me as crossing some sort of border and of course would involve incorporating elements that you did not photograph yourself.

Chatgpt

This free AI interface can be useful though needs to be taken with a pinch of salt regarding facts. This is what I got when I asked for ideas of what to photograph for the theme of "shambles":

ChatGPT

Capturing a dilapidated and rundown building with broken windows and crumbling walls, highlighting the architectural shambles.

Photographing a chaotic and messy artist's studio, showcasing paint-splattered canvases, scattered brushes, and disorganized art supplies.

Taking a close-up shot of a tangled mass of electrical wires and cables, representing the technological shambles we often encounter.

Snapping a picture of a crowded and disorganized bookstore with books haphazardly piled on shelves and scattered on the floor, portraying a literary shambles.

Photographing a group of abandoned shopping carts in a neglected parking lot, symbolizing the consumerist shambles.

Capturing a tangled mess of tree branches and foliage after a storm, representing the natural shambles caused by unpredictable weather.

Taking a picture of a cluttered and chaotic kitchen with dirty dishes, spilled ingredients, and disarrayed utensils, highlighting the culinary shambles.

Snapping a shot of a jumble of mismatched shoes and socks in a messy wardrobe, symbolizing the fashion shambles of an indecisive dresser.

Photographing a cluttered desk with scattered papers, pens, and office supplies, symbolizing the disorganized work environment and professional shambles.

Capturing a disheveled and chaotic children's playroom with toys strewn all over the floor,
